With the Covid pandemic era coming to an end, Ohio employers are faced with the unusual circumstance of trying to find workers to fill vacant positions in their businesses.

Time and time again the signs and postings read "Hiring", yet not many are lining up to fill these jobs. Some reasons that this shortage might exist are due to low wages, layoffs, health insecurity, child care needs, and any number of personal issues that arose from the disruption caused by the pandemic

Employers have been forced to come up with numerous ways to entice workers to join their ranks. The most common way is an increase in the hourly wage. Raising the wage to a more sustainable amount does draw some employees in, but that is still not enough to fill the vacancies that exist. Other incentives might include sign on bonuses, benefit packages, overtime availability and on the job training. Even with all of this, employers are still scrambling to hire the man/ woman force needed to run their companies at the level they were accustomed to prior covid.

Now that the effects of Covid are waning, hopefully this trend of employer/ employee inequity will turn around in 2023.

FLYING HIGH GRADUATES SDAR ABOVE ADVERSITY

DeOndre Walker decided to make a change in his life after the murder of his 16-year-old cousin, Isaiah Walker. #DoItForZay became more than a slogan, Walker said, but a way of life. "Not only did I love him, but he looked up to me, I was a role model to him and he valued my opinion. Most of all, I had his respect," Walker said during the Professional Development Center, a division of Flying High Inc.'s, winter graduation ceremony.

Walker was one of 28 individuals who received certificates of completion in different vocational trainings. He received his commercial driver's license through Flying High's partnership with

NEO Truck Driver Training.

After years of "doing things he wasn't proud of", Walker decided it was time to make a change and go back to school to better himself. Isaiah's murder in May, was the final push he needed. He recalled being sat down by his uncle and asked what he did to better Isaiah's short life. "All I could say was 'survive'. Then I realized that I never taught him anything or showed him anything that let him be successful. So from that day on, I gave up doing anything negative that wasn't improving my life in a positive way."

"There are so many times in life when we go through things that cause us to shut down or be submissive to a semblance of what we've been shown and thinking that's all we could be," Walker said. "But I challenge you to overcome your adversity and master your own fate. For me, it was knowing the new path that I chose would have made him(Isaiah) proud."

Flying High helps individuals remove barriers that might prevent them from obtaining employment, such as substance abuse. PDC offers programs in welding and machining, as well as certifications for state tested nursing aides and chemical dependency counselor assistants. Students can also complete a GED.

NEW RE-ENTRY PEER SUPPORTER TRAINING PROGRAM AT DhioMHAS

Fall of 2022 brought a new training program to the valley. The program is called Re-Entry Peer Supporter Training and was held at the Professional Development Center Trumbull in Warren. Peer Recovery Supporters (**PRS**) is an all-inclusive term consisting of peer specialists, recovery coaches, and peer supporters. Peer Recovery Supporter was chosen as it represents the three largest sections of the current peer workforce.

Those who were eligible for training would have a "direct lived" experience of incarceration ("Direct lived experience" means that you are personally in recovery from a mental health and/or substance use issue having a friend or family member in recovery does not qualify you for PRS certification). and would have a desire to help their peers who are re-entering their communities

This program was held from October 31st to November 4th from 8;30—5;00 each day. Priority was given to Trumbull and Mahoning county residents. 40 hours of training was required and ll training sessions were in person.

CCCTC and MCCTC ADULT PROGRAM GRADUATES

The CCCTC 2022 practical nursing class graduated on September 15, 2022. Fifty three students were awarded their diplomas and nursing pins at the ceremony. The next cohort for the practical nursing program will begin in September 2023. Entrance testing will begin in January. Prospective students can contact Kevin at 330-424-9561 ext. 176 to get registered for the exam. CCCTC Adult Education is offering FREE STNA training to those who qualify for the grant that the school has been awarded. Any student currently on government assistance can be approved for the grant and have their tuition for the nurse aide program covered 100%. Call Kevin to see if you qualify and to find out the dates for the next class.





The MCCTC Adult Career Center Automotive Technology students completed their 14 month career training program and were recognized at a special ceremony. The students spent 900 hours in training to pursue a career as an automotive technician specializing in maintenance and light repair. Throughout the program they received extensive hands-on training from experienced instructors following NATEF standards.

ESC PROVIDES CAREER EXPLORATION COURSES

CAREER COUNSELORS

The Career Counselors at the Educational Service Center of Eastern Ohio provide middle school career exploration courses to over 20 school districts in the Mahoning Valley. The Career Counseling team is embedded directly into districts providing valuable services to our students.

In the newly established Career Pathways and Healthy Child class at Campbell Elementary school, the team meets with the 5th and 6th grade students to introduce them to qualities of an employable person and engage the students in activities that keep the students thinking about career choices. In Lowellville, Career Counselors meet with all 8th grade students to help each student create their OhioMeansJobs accounts, provide assessments, then cater career experiences based on career inventory results.

Students in the Entrepreneurship class at Struthers Middle school have been working on developing their leadership skills through teamwork activities. Embedded into lessons are critical thinking, problem solving, leadership, collaboration, communication, and listening skills.

Austintown Middle School eighth graders have been hard at work tackling financial literacy this school year. Students have been placed into different life scenarios where they are asked to choose and research a career, then use the information to plan, purchase, and budget all while using their critical thinking and math skills to determine their household budgets and lifestyle.

MORE NEWS FROM THE ESC...

Starting in the 2022-2023 school year, the Educational Service Center of Eastern Ohio (ESCEO) hired two social workers from funding received from the Extended Learning and Recovery (ELAR) grant. This addition to the ESCEO team allowed for an expansion of prevention services, traumainformed care, and district programming support. The social workers and the ESCEO's Prevention

Coordinator/Family and Community Partnership Liaison work in coordination with the State Support Team Region 5 as well as other departments within the ESCEO to produce carefully curated and collaborative efforts. There is great work being done to scaffold prevention programming in districts using PAX Good Behavior Game and Botvin LifeSkills (also grant funded, communitypartnership supported programming). As this team takes an emphasis on best practice, safe and welcoming school culture, and datadriven decision making, they are excited to continue to expand school building and district level impact. Taking intentional efforts to braid together initiatives and align work with individual building needs, additional growth in areas of support to schools and staff will continue. Leveraging the PBIS (positive behavior intervention and support) and MTSS (multi tiered systems of support) frameworks schools use, the social workers will bring an attuned focus to implementation of family and community engagement and meeting the needs of the whole child, especially ways to meet student mental health needs.

OHID TO WORK INITIATIVE-END OF YEAR ROUNDUP

In 2022, OhioMeansJobs (OMJ) Mahoning and Columbiana Counties and the Mahoning and Columbiana Training Association (MCTA) were part of the Ohio to Work (OTW) initiative. The OTW initiative designed to help employers fill positions and help individuals improve their quality of life and reskill and retrain for in demand employment opportunities. OhioToWork helped to drive customers to our OhioMeansJobs centers to learn more about training opportunities that could be provided through the grants for in demand careers. YouScience assessment.

The assessment offers clients hope, relevance, and direction by expanding one's vision of opportunities YouScience also provides tips on how to use information gathered for current and future success.

Staff at OMJ centers were granted an extension tooffer this assessment tool to clients through December 31, 2023, even though the OTW initiative wrapped up in December 2022. In a recent report from Jobs Ohio, we were informed that regional efforts surpassed goals early in the campaign in the categories of "number of jobseekers served and number of jobseekers enrolled" in reskilling with Ohio To Work training provider partners. In November, the third goal was met in the "number of job seekers who received placement offers" category.

Regional Ohio To Work partners included Flying HIGH, National Center for Urban Solutions, United Returning Citizens, OhioMeansJobs Trumbull county, and OhioMeansJobs Mahoning and Columbiana Counties.

This past year approximately 4,500 customers visited the OMJ centers, both in person and virtually to access a variety of employment services that include workshops, job search options and training funds through MCTA.

COMMUNITY PLANNED EVENTS—PAST AND FUTURE

Kid Steam University-The Columbiana County Business Advisory Council, the Columbiana County ESC and Kent State East Liverpool and Salem teamed up to host the annual Kids STEAM University on September 10th at the Salem KSU campus. It was a family day where children, preschool through grade five, participated in science, technology, engineering, art and math activities. This year's event featured 27 learning stations for students.

Manufacturing Your Future-On October 25th, the Columbiana County Business Advisory Council collaborated with Congressman Bill Johnson, the Salem SOD Center, the Mahoning Valley Manufacturers Coalition and the Columbiana County Career Center to provide a "Manufacturing Your Future" day for 100 high school sophomores from 9 local school districts. Students had the opportunity to tour two manufacturers of their choice and learn more about the expectations of employers. Participating manufacturers included: Butech; Compco; Hickey Metals; MAC Trailer; TruCut; Humtown Products; Ventra and CTM Labeling Systems. Participating schools included: Beaver Local; Crestview; East Liverpool; Leetonia; Lisbon; Salem; Southern Local; United and West Branch.

Mark Perna Kicks off Back to School Event-The Columbiana ESC sponsored Mark Perna to kick off the Back to School professional development program for local schools and the Columbiana Business Advisory Council.
